THE POTATO

TALK LIKE A LOCAL

Despite the common misnomer “BOY-zee,” locals lovingly correct it to “BOY-see,” also known as The City of Trees. This moniker, rooted in its French etymology meaning “wooded” or “forested,” encapsulates the lush landscapes and tree-lined streets.

Navigating the unique pronunciations of towns and streets can be a challenge. For instance, Ustick is pronounced “You-stick,” Chinden Boulevard, “Chin-din” a contraction of “CHINEse garDEN,” pays homage to the Chinese settlers and their bountiful gardens in what is now Garden City. The town of Kuna, contrary to intuitive pronunciation, sounds more like “Q-na.”

COMMUNITY OF COURTESY

The Treasure Valley is characterized by its friendly and warm atmosphere, where manners, mutual respect, and kindness are deeply embedded in the community’s culture. This welcoming nature is expressed through everyday interactions like smiles, eye contact, holding doors, and friendly conversations, reinforcing the Valley’s reputation as being hospitable and congenial.

The area has experienced an influx of newcomers. As the population grows, it brings a shared duty to respect the environment. Keeping cities clean, preserving wildlife, and protecting natural habitats are not just civic duties but are also essential to sustaining the quality of life that Idaho offers.

TATER KINGS

Idaho isn’t just famous for potatoes; it’s the U.S. champion, producing a whopping one-third of the nation’s spuds. Talk about being a potato powerhouse!

Driving culture is marked by courtesy and cooperation, evident in behaviors like smooth merging and efficient roundabout use.

For those residing in Boise or its surrounding areas, having a car is recommended, especially for those living outside the city. Public transit, mainly provided by Valley Regional Transit, is available but might not be sufficient for all travel outside of Boise city.



TRANSIT TIPS

DRIVE COURTEOUSLY

ALL ABOUT ROUNDABOUTS

In Boise’s roundabouts, yield to traffic already in the circle. When entering, choose the correct lane early: right lane for right turns or straight ahead, left lane for left turns or U-turns. The essentials:

Lane Choice: Select your lane before entering and stick to it throughout.

Yield: Yield to both pedestrians and oncoming traffic when entering and exiting the roundabout. Don’t stop once inside; incoming traffic should yield to you.

Caution and Speed: Slow down for safety, staying alert for pedestrians, unexpected lane changes, and large or emergency vehicles.

ZIPPERING 101: A QUICK OVERVIEW

The zipper merge, used correctly, counters the issues of early merging at “lane closed ahead” signs, which can cause traffic jams and frustration. Using both lanes fully until the merge point, then alternating turns to merge, much like a zipper’s teeth. This technique balances lane speeds, cuts traffic backup by up to 40%, and smooths out congestion at freeway interchanges, ensuring a fair and efficient flow for all lanes.

- Use both lanes until the merge point.
- Alternate turns merging for fairness and efficiency.
- Best used in heavy, slow-moving traffic.

Soak in the Seasons

Boise experiences four distinct seasons, with blossoming springs, warm summers, colorful autumns, and serene snowy winters, each providing a varied and lively atmosphere throughout the year.

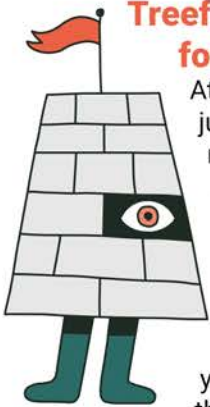
Looking Back

Gowen Thunder Air Show *August*

The **Gowen Thunder Air Show** in Boise, Idaho, is an exhilarating annual event that showcases the world of aviation. Spectators are treated to awe-inspiring aerial performances by skilled pilots flying various aircraft, from high-speed jets to historic planes. Western Idaho Fair *August*

Summer Traditions: Festivals & Parades

Meridian Dairy Days is held the third weekend of June at Storey Park celebrating the rich dairy heritage of Meridian with a full lineup of events, including a carnival, golf tournament, Meridian Speedway race, Dairy Days Parade, live shows, and much more.

Eagle Fun Days, a two-day extravaganza in early July, featuring Family Fun Night, live music, a car show, the Wet & Wild parade, cornhole tournament, and the unique Rocky Mountain Oyster Feed.

Kuna Days is in early August at Bernie Fisher Park, featuring live music, vendors, and a family movie night. Saturday includes the Boy Scouts Pancake Breakfast, Kuna Days Fun Run, a parade on Main Street, and a free kids carnival at the East Baseball Field. The festivities conclude with the Kuna Days Fireworks Show.

The Nampa Festival of the Arts *Nampa - August*

A cultural event that started in 1986 at Lakeview Park, celebrates the creative talents and artistic expressions of the community, showcasing a variety of arts including fine arts, jewelry, and old-world crafts. Initiated by the **Nampa Parks and Recreation Department** and the **Nampa Art Guild**, this festival provides a platform for local artists to exhibit and sell their work, and features entertainment and country crafts.

September

The Spirit of Boise Balloon Classic has a distinguished history in Boise, drawing thousands of locals and tourists to Ann Morrison Park over multiple days. This annual event features a stunning display of colorful balloons, uplifting music, and local radio stations, creating an unforgettable experience.

Launches are typically early morning and dependent on weather conditions, with hot air balloons floating over downtown Boise, occasionally gracing historic landmarks like building rooftops, Broadway Avenue, and the Capitol building's front lawn.

The festival provides free tethered rides on Kid's Day, opportunities to meet pilots each morning, and an unforgettable Nite Glow spectacular.

Art in the Park

September

Art in the Park is held at **Julia Davis Park** and is a highly regarded cultural event in the Northwest. Hosted by the **Boise Art Museum**, this free and open-to-the-public festival showcases over 200 artists' creations for purchase. The three-day event presents an array of contemporary arts and crafts, complemented by delightful food, live music, entertainment, and engaging hands-on activities for children.

Boise Entrepreneur Week

October

Held annually at **JUMP, Boise Entrepreneur Week**, is Idaho's premier event for entrepreneurship and innovation. Boise Baroque Summer Concerts

August-September

Downtown Boise: The Greenbelt passes through the heart of downtown Boise, with several access points from parks, streets, and bridges spanning the Boise River.

Garden City: As you move west, Garden City provides additional entry points to the Greenbelt.

For those seeking an adrenaline rush, **Boise's Whitewater Park** situated along the Boise River, adjacent to **Quinn's Pond**, offers a thrilling urban water experience with engineered waves and chutes for kayaking, paddleboarding, and surfing, with three additional in-river wave structures catering to various skill levels, and a plaza area with scenic viewing spots. Rentals are available for those looking to embark on an exciting whitewater adventure. As a vital hub for water sports and community gatherings, it adds a refreshing dimension to Boise's lifestyle.

The area around Boise offers a variety of paddleboarding and kayaking spots, each with unique characteristics. **The Boise River** is ideal for a relaxing float through the city, while nearby **Lucky Peak Reservoir**, **Quinn's Pond**, and **Esther Simplot Park** have calm, easily accessible waters. **Lake Lowell**, in the Deer Flat National Wildlife Refuge, and **Celebration Park on the Snake River** offer scenic surroundings. **Robie Creek Park** provides a quiet retreat in a park-like environment for those seeking a blend of water and greenery.

Floating the Boise River

Floating the Boise River is a summer tradition in the area. The float, which covers about 6 miles and lasts approximately 2-3 hours, allows individuals to enjoy a self-guided experience. The journey starts at **Barber Park**, offering convenient raft and tube rentals, along with a shuttle bus service for accessibility, concluding at **Ann Morrison Park**.

While the Boise River remains open throughout the year, the float season and Barber Park's services, equipment rentals, and shuttle operations are contingent on suitable river and weather conditions, typically available from late June through Labor Day. *Persons 14 years-old and under must wear a life jacket.*

Boating and Watersports

Boating, waterskiing, and wakeboarding are a popular summer activities. **Lucky Peak Reservoir** stands out for summer boating with unique boat-in areas, accessing over 45 miles of shoreline and 80 picnic/camping sites. These boat-in areas, offer spots for midday picnics, group camping, or stargazing.

Lake Lowell near Nampa has evolved into a popular recreation destination, with boating, swimming, and fishing activities amidst the oasis of southwest Idaho. Black Canyon Reservoir, northeast of Emmett, extends over 1,100 acres with 12 miles of shoreline, serving as a prime destination for boating, fishing, swimming, and camping, complete with amenities like restrooms, boat ramps, picnic tables, and accessible facilities.

Hunt & Cast: Boise's Prime Spots for Outdoor Adventure

In Idaho, hunting is a significant part of the culture, offering a range of game and outdoor experiences across various seasons. The state's terrain, including the **Sawtooth Mountains** and **Clearwater National Forest**, provides ideal settings for big game hunting in the fall, and bird hunting in late fall and early spring. Idaho also offers excellent fishing opportunities throughout the year in places like the **Snake River** and **Henry's Lake**, targeting trout, salmon, bass, and catfish.

For both hunting and fishing, the **Idaho Department of Fish and Game** provides essential information on regulations, licenses, and permits, accessible on their official website (<https://idfg.idaho.gov/>).



FUN FACT The Cutthroat Trout (*Oncorhynchus clarkii*) is the official state fish of Idaho, home to 3 distinct subspecies. The name "cutthroat" refers to the red coloration on the underside of the trout's lower jaw.

Cascade Raft & Kayak Located on the Payette River just 45 min from Boise, this company has been a favorite for whitewater rafting since 1985. They offer various levels of rafting adventures, including both thrilling and milder family-friendly experiences, along with kayaking and ziplining. Their facility includes amenities like a café and gift shop .

Bear Valley Rafting Co. Conveniently located less than an hour from downtown Boise. They provide both half-day and full-day rafting trips on the Payette River, catering to a range of skill levels and preferences, with trips including guided services and meals.

Boise River Outdoor This outfitter provides guided, relaxing rafting trips on the Boise River, suitable for all ages, including children and seniors. Their services include essentials like helmets, life jackets, and snacks, making them a great option for family-friendly rafting.





TRAILS

Explore Boise's trails, ranging from easy and family-friendly to more challenging, for both casual walkers, avid hikers, and mountain bikers, many with dog-friendly options.

BOISE RIVER GREENBELT TRAIL Ann Morrison Park stretching 10.1 miles with a modest elevation gain, features a well-maintained path with varying surfaces from paved concrete to packed gravel. It's designed for accessibility, with a gentle grade and width of at least 8 feet, suitable for wheelchairs, mobility equipment, and strollers. This riverside trail is accessible throughout the year.

RED CLIFFS NATURE CENTER TRAIL is a 3.1-mile loop known for its moderate challenge and steady climb, taking about 1.5 hours to complete. Popular for hiking, mountain biking, and running, it's open year-round. The trail welcomes dogs, with designated off-leash areas.

VETERANS AND BIG SPRINGS LOOP TRAIL a 2.3-mile route near Eagle, offers a moderately challenging hike typically taking about 1 hour to complete. Popular for hiking, mountain biking, and running, it's a great trail for enjoying peaceful moments, dogs to be leashed.

TABLE ROCK TRAIL is a moderately challenging 3.9-mile loop trail, typically takes about 2 hours to complete. Popular for hiking and horseback riding from March to November, it allows leashed dogs but has limited shade and no water, so carrying your own water is essential. Notable landmarks like "the Cross" and the "quarry" with a city overlook, open during daylight hours only.

THE BETHINE CHURCH RIVER TRAIL at Baggley Park is a 2.7-mile out-and-back trail with an easy walking and birding route that takes about 47 minutes to complete. Great for hikers and walkers and welcomes dogs on leashes, though bikes are not allowed.

HULLS GULCH NATURE TRAIL is a 6.3-mile out-and-back trail accessed via a maintained 3-mile dirt road, recognized for its moderate difficulty, usually taking about 3 hours. The trail offers stunning views of Boise, a seasonal creek with waterfalls, and a canopy of pine trees. Open from March through November, perfect for hiking enthusiasts, with areas for dogs to roam off-leash.

BUCKTAIL, SHANE'S, CENTRAL RIDGE TRAILS, AND THE MILITARY RESERVE form a 6.9-mile loop, a moderately challenging hike typically completed in 3 hours. Open year-round, this system is popular for birding, hiking, and horseback riding. Dogs are allowed, with some off-leash areas. The Bucktail Trail is specifically for downhill mountain biking (riders should go counterclockwise), while the Two Point Trail accommodates dual-direction pedestrian traffic.

Trail Tact: Navigating Boise's Pathways

The 210-mile network, known as the Ridge to Rivers Foothills trail system, managed by the Bureau of Land Management, emphasizes trail etiquette for a peaceful, safe experience. Users, including hikers, bikers, and horseback riders, should practice courteous behavior such as announcing "on your left" when overtaking a fellow trail-goer, and yielding to uphill traffic. Being mindful of nature, avoiding wet trails, and following dog rules, ensures a positive environment for all.

You'll find an impressive collection of golf courses in and around the Boise area. **Shadow Valley Golf Course** in Garden City offers a meticulously designed course with engaging challenges. **Pierce Park Greens** is a par-3 course ideal for a casual round. **Riverside Golf Course** combines scenic beauty with a challenging layout, and **Hillcrest Country Club** provides a well-established course with traditional and modern features. **Crane Creek Country Club** offers a challenging and landscaped course. **Indian Lakes Golf Club** provides an 18-hole course surrounded by natural beauty. **Boise Ranch Golf Course** (boiseranchgc.com) is known for its well-designed layout. **Warm Springs Golf Course** offers a historic setting. Concluding the Boise options, **Quail Hollow Golf Club** is a picturesque course.

Lakeview Golf Course in Meridian provides a welcoming atmosphere and a family-friendly environment for golfers.

Moving into Eagle, **BanBury Golf Course** features an 18-hole championship layout with water features. **Eagle Hills Golf Course** boasts a meticulously maintained course with beautiful views.

In Kuna, **Falcon Crest Golf Club** (falconcrestgolf.com) is renowned for its stunning views. **River Birch Golf Course** (riverbirchgolfcourse.net) in Star, offers an idyllic setting.

Stepping into Nampa's courses, you'll enjoy a perfect blend of challenge and enjoyment and well-maintained greens at **Centennial Golf Course**, while **RedHawk Golf Course** provides a championship layout with stunning Owyhee Mountain views. **TimberStone Golf Course** in Caldwell, known for its challenging design, hosts various events, and **Purple Sage Golf Course** welcomes golfers of all levels.

It's a perfect destination for golf enthusiasts and novices alike, where families and friends can gather for a fun-filled day of golf, dining, and relaxation in a welcoming setting.



Skiing, Snowboarding, And Tubing

Bogus Basin Ski Resort is the closest ski resort to Boise, only 40 minutes away. Enjoy alpine skiing and snowboarding across 2,600 acres of terrain with 88 runs served by 10 lifts. If you're into Nordic skiing, the trails provide a serene connection with nature. Visitors can also enjoy the tubing hill or fat tire biking on the Nordic Trails.

Tamarack Resort, located 95 miles north of Boise, stands out with the largest vertical drop in the McCall area, runs for all skill levels, three terrain parks, fat tire biking, and snowshoeing in a picturesque setting. Exceptional amenities, including a quaint village retail area, convenient daycare services, varied dining options, and a selection of lodging accommodations. Guided ice fishing on Lake Cascade are also available.

Located just 9 miles north of McCall, **Brundage Mountain** features wide groomed runs, substantial snowfall, and a 1,921-foot vertical drop. Equipped with six lifts and varied ski runs, including two terrain parks, guided Snowcat tours across 18,000 acres of terrain, snowmobile tours & rentals, Snowshoeing on groomed trails for exploring the mountain. Family-friendly options include drive-up daycare, a children's center, and multiple dining options. Brundage also features the **McCall Activity Barn**, offering family-friendly snow tubing with a Magic Carpet conveyor belt for quick access to the top.

Little Ski Hill, just 2 miles north of McCall, may be small, but its charm and history, along with night skiing and an airbag-equipped terrain park for perfecting tricks. With approximately 180 inches of annual snowfall, a vertical drop of 405 feet, one lift, four named ski runs, and a terrain park.

Sun Valley Resort, a destination spot not to be missed, just a 2.5 hr drive from Boise. Features two mountains for skiing: Bald Mountain, offering 3,400 vertical feet and over 2,400 acres of varied terrain and challenging runs, and Dollar Mountain, perfect for beginners and children with gentle slopes and family-friendly amenities.

At **Gateway Park in Eagle Island**, enjoy a snow tubing adventure suitable for the whole family, with a convenient magic carpet lift and tubes available for use.

Treasure Valley is home to a multitude of parks that cater to a wide range of outdoor activities and interests. Showcased are a selection of these parks, highlighting their unique facilities and features suitable for all ages and interests.

TULLY PARK

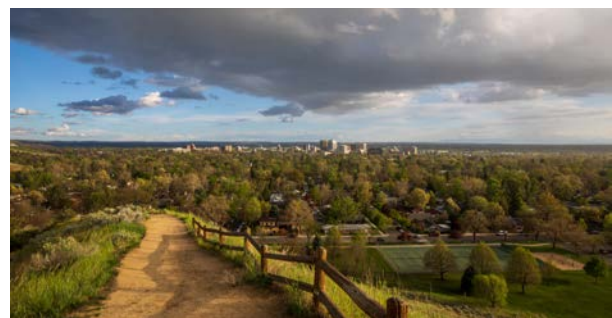

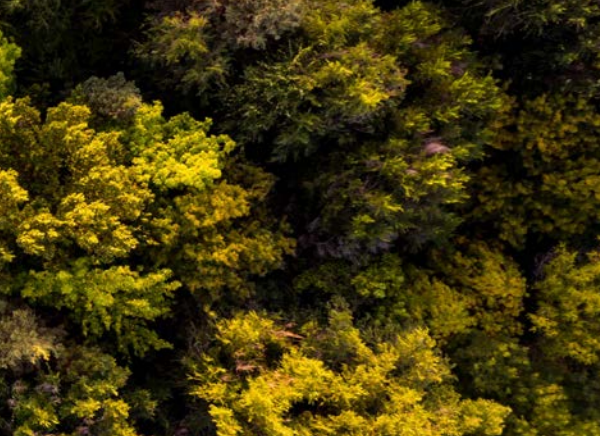

A large playing field, little league facilities, playground, splash pad, and picnic shelters.

A premier biking destination with trails, courses, and terrains suitable for all skill levels, including skills areas and a BMX course.

PETIQ DOG PARK

Two dog runs, public bathrooms, a picnic shelter, and a drinking fountain for people and dogs.

WINCHESTER PARK

Close to downtown Kuna, includes walking paths, tennis courts, picnic areas, playgrounds, and is home to abundant wildlife such as herons, hawks, and deer.

BUTLER PARK

Lucky Peak State Park

Lucky Peak is a popular recreational area comprising three distinct units.

Discovery Park, at the base of Lucky Peak Dam, offers a peaceful setting for fishing and picnics, while **Sandy Point** is known for its sandy beach, perfect for swimming and sunbathing. **Spring Shores**, at the reservoir's upper end, caters to boating and water sports enthusiasts with its marina and rental services. The park as a whole provides stunning views and opportunities for wildlife observation.

Hot Springs

Idaho has the most natural soakable geothermal pools than any other state. Experience one of the many springs, from establishments of constructed pools catering to family-friendly experience and optional lodging, to trekking through nature to a more remote natural springs along mountain trails. Here are a few favorite spots (some are closely guarded local secrets).

THE SPRINGS

This luxurious hot spring is known for its high-class soaking experience. It offers private tubs and stunning scenic views, and overnight stays are available. The springs require reservations and are open Friday through Sunday.

MIRACLE HOT SPRINGS

Located about 1 hour and 45 minutes east of Boise near Hagerman, this resort offers geothermal pools and 21 VIP private pools. It's a great spot for camping, events, and workshops.

HAVEN HOT SPRINGS POOL

Just 20 minutes outside of Boise, this hot spring offers a retreat-like experience with private booking options. It opened in 1951 and features fresh mineral water and scenic views.

TRINITY HOT SPRINGS

About 100 miles from Boise, this destination has mineral rich emerald green water, mountain side views, and an attached resort. The pool temperatures typically stay above 90 degrees Fahrenheit.

TOP INSIDER TIPS

When visiting hot springs, especially non-commercial springs, consider the following:

1. Wear sturdy sandals or water shoes for river crossings, as the rocks can be sharp.
2. Exercise caution on slippery rocks.
3. Hot springs are popular, expect some company.
4. Be aware that clothing is optional; nude bathers may be present.
5. Dogs should not soak in the hot springs.
6. Bring essentials like a towel, water bottle, dry bag, and snacks.
7. Download a map beforehand. Cell service might be unreliable.
8. Always clean up after yourself and avoid leaving any trash behind.
9. Glass bottles should be avoided.
10. Do not use soap or shampoo, even biodegradable types.

Primitive Springs

Pine Flats Hot Springs is unique for its location right underneath a waterfall with a series of cliffside pools.

Kirkham Hot Springs is a popular destination with pools that maintain a temperature of 95-110 degrees in the Boise National Forest.

Trail Creek Hot Springs located in the Payette National Forest, features pools made from boulders and cement next to the river.
